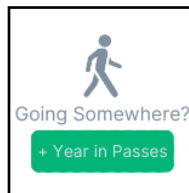

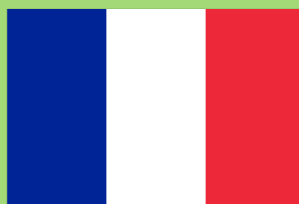

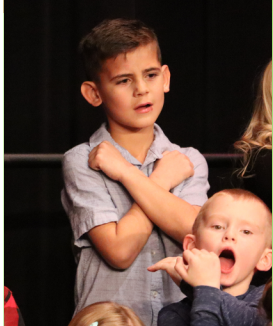

The true finale, however, was the fluffy snowflakes that fell from above the stage, covering the performers and surprising students and audience members alike. Students' excitement

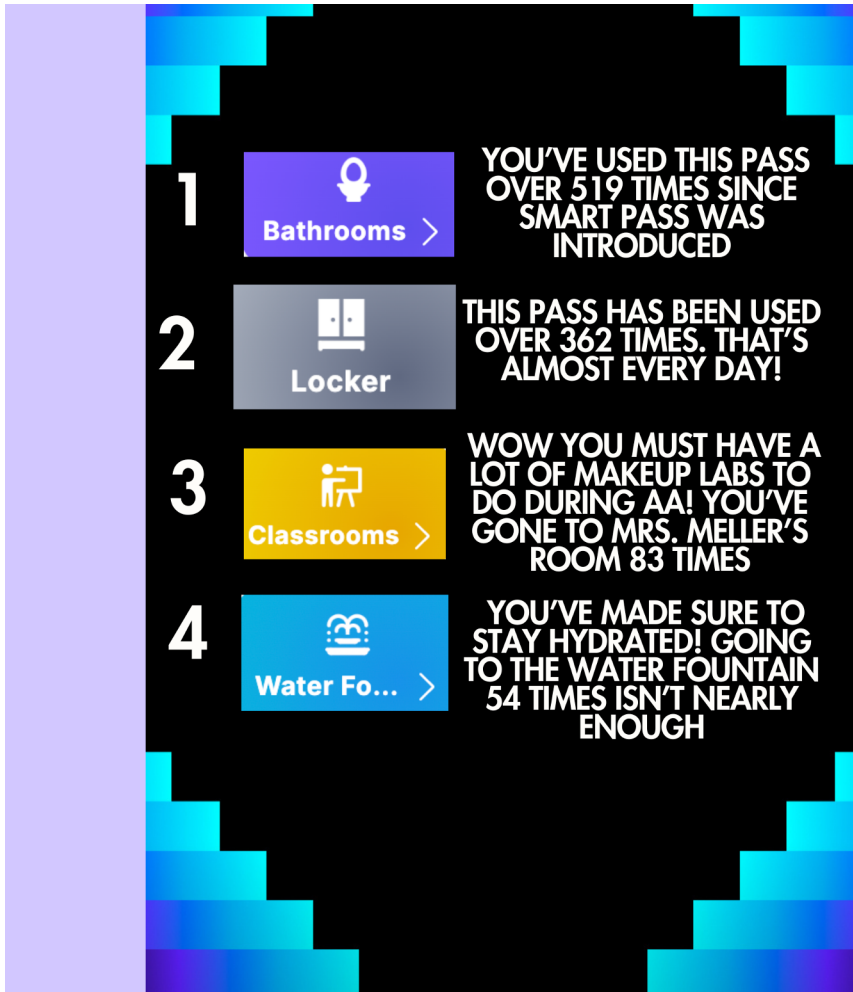


was evident, as squeals of joy flowed from the stage. The flurries blew in the Christmas spirit and left attendees excited for the season.

After the game, WKSD, a radio station from Paulding, awarded Jack with Player of the Game for his ability to score, rebound the ball, play lockdown defense, and find open teammates for assists.

He spends lots of time practicing: working very hard in the gym, getting up shots, and dedicating his weekends to playing on an AAU basketball team during the off-season.
